

In 2006 I made the greatest discovery of my life in Scouting. Up until that point I had done nearly everything that I thought Scouting had to offer. I had earned my Eagle, served in OA leadership positions, attended Jamborees and NOACs, and served on staff for summer camp and other events in addition to all that I had done with my troop. But in the summer of 2006 I was surprised to discover what became my favorite and most rewarding

a life changing experience. SummitCorps will take place in four, one-week sessions starting July 3rd. Participants will be building trail along the New River Gorge National River, helping to lay the foundation for future Boy Scout use at this beautiful national property. Crews will spend several days providing service and will have a day to enjoy recreational activities along the

New River.

Registration is open to any youth or adult Arrowman who meets Philmont height and weight requirements. The deadline for lodges to reserve space for their contingent was December 1, 2010. Even though that deadline has passed, there's still time to sign up your lodge contingent! Lodges were each given 8 slots at the start of the registration process; the quota was lifted on January 21 and lodges will be able to register as many participants as they'd like. In addition to taking part in the fun and excitement of SummitCorps, your lodge also has the opportunity to jumpstart its American Indian activities program at Indian Summer. Indian Summer is a one-stop shop for all things American Indian related: whether it's singing, dancing or OA ceremonies and inductions. Arrowmen will have the opportunity to study all areas of American Indian activities or OA ceremonies and inductions - they do not have to focus on just one area. As part of the Indian Summer activities participants will be divided into nations, with each nation having its own tribes and clans to share experiences

What makes Indian Summer a standout program is the specific attention given to participants by meeting them at their ability level. Whether a seasoned ceremonialist or a novice dancer, each Indian Summer participant will walk away better prepared for the next pow-wow or ceremony.

2011 Service Grants Recipients

Eleven lodges have been selected to receive \$30,000 in matching service grants from the National OA Committee in 2011. The grants are for lodge service projects that improve camps or service centers. The OA provides up to 50% of the money for a service project, with a \$5,000 maximum. This year, three of the recipients are lodges from the Western Region.



Toloma Lodge of the Greater Yosemite Council will receive \$3,150 to expand and protect its water supply at Camp John Mensinger. This will enable increased attendance capacity for their local summer camp program.



Sikhs Mox Lamonti Lodge of the Mount Baker Council will receive \$1,950 to create a Cub Scout friendly campsite at their Fire Mountain facility.



Nisqually Lodge of the Pacific Harbors Council will receive \$1,950 to build a blacksmith program shelter at its local Scout Reservation.
